Your Excellency,

On 25-30 June 2008 the Council of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) – representing the LWF's global constituency of churches in 78 countries around the world – met in Arusha, United Republic of Tanzania. Meeting in Africa at this time, the LWF Council could not fail to address the deepening political and humanitarian emergency in Zimbabwe. The Council voted to issue a statement on the eve of the presidential run-off election in Zimbabwe on 27 June 2008 in which they called “for an immediate end to political violence and repression in that country, and the restoration of the democracy for which so many Zimbabweans have struggled and died”. The Council especially denounced “the systematic, organized, politically-motivated intimidation and violence whereby the current government has sought to retain power.” We noted, with great sadness, that “[t]he attacks on Zimbabweans for exercising their right of democratic choice are directly contrary to the purpose of the struggle for Zimbabwe's liberation from colonial rule.” Moreover, the Council declared that “the policies and practices of the current government have undermined the most basic political, economic and social rights of the people of Zimbabwe.”

In the light of these observations and concerns, the LWF Council called for the urgent establishment of a process for building peace in Zimbabwe in which all national actors, regional organizations and the international community are engaged. The Council especially emphasized the importance of regional responses to the crisis, calling on “the Southern African Development Community and the African Union, and all African leaders, to take a more active role in promoting human security in Zimbabwe and encouraging a political transition back to the democracy that the people of Zimbabwe have a right to expect.”

The situation in Zimbabwe is a moral challenge to all Africans, and presents a critical test of the effectiveness of the institutions that have been created to promote peace, democracy, political stability and economic prosperity in Africa. The SADC vision, of a common future in a regional community that will ensure economic well-being, improvement of the standards of living and quality of life, freedom and social justice and peace and security for the peoples of Southern Africa, is undermined by what is happening in Zimbabwe. SADC members have carried a heavy burden as a result of the chaos in Zimbabwe, with millions of Zimbabweans having been obliged to cross borders and leave their country due to the humanitarian and political situation. The LWF Council expressed its gratitude for the hospitality of those neighboring countries that have received them. The ongoing crisis is, however, a direct threat to the stability and prosperity of the region. If SADC is unable to act quickly and effectively



to confront the situation in Zimbabwe, its purpose will be called into question and its history indelibly stained.

I write to you in your capacity as Chair of SADC in order to acknowledge and express our appreciation for the rising chorus of concern from African leaders and the efforts and initiatives already undertaken through SADC and by individual SADC members. I ask you to further increase your efforts to promote a return to genuine democracy in Zimbabwe and to avoid even worse suffering for its people. Ultimately, your priority – and the priority of all Africans and the whole international community – must be for the welfare of the people of Zimbabwe rather than the rivalries and ambitions of its leaders.

We in the Lutheran World Federation are praying for wisdom to prevail, and for a return to peace, justice and prosperity for Zimbabwe. As the LWF Council declared in Arusha, we stand ready – along with all those of goodwill in the international community – “to support the people of Zimbabwe in rebuilding their nation, and in restoring their betrayed hopes of a life in dignity and justice.”
